A Happy Ending Isn't the Whole Story

"Is there a happy ending?"

When my kids were young, we never made it past the first whiff of any narrative tension before I got this question. As soon as whatever princess or furry woodland animal who was the hero of the story got into any small scrape, they wanted that reassurance, "Is there a happy ending?"

I can't say I blame them. Don't we all feel that way sometimes? We enter into a relationship with someone or some situation, and we just want to protect ourselves. We want to know it's not going to go badly — or, if it does, that we will be able to come back from it. It's a human instinct, a reflex. Our inclination to protect ourselves makes it so that we sometimes want to press fast-forward on the bad stuff and skip straight ahead to the happily-ever-after.

Easter is the ultimate happy ending. It's the day of miracles. The day when all the stones roll away and all the sins are forgiven. It's the day that puts everything right.

But if we learned anything from this week — from the Passion and death of the Lord — it's that we can't press fast-forward on the hardships of life. That tension, that loss, that fear — it's crucial, isn't it? As Catholics, we are who we are because of Easter. But Easter doesn't happen without Good Friday.

So, does the story of salvation have a happy ending? We know it does. But we also remember that the ending isn't all that matters.

1849-2024 175 CHURCH OF SAINT PATRICK



1893-1904

Father John G. Fitzgerald was assigned to the pastorate in 1893 and remained for eleven years. At that time, the entire plant of St. Patrick needed repair and renovation. The exterior of the wood framed church building was renovated with replacement boards and then painted. The renovated church interior included new pews and windows with two side altars dedicated to the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph.

Father Fitzgerald replaced the rectory that was heavily damaged by fire. The new building was erected between 1894 and 1896 at a cost of \$12,000. He also replaced the school with a two-story brick building costing \$30,000.

Father Fitzgerald with his two assistants Fr. Jeremiah Kent and Fr. Peter Matthews established the Holy Name Society for Men, The Blessed Virgin Sodality for young women and The Angels Sodality for young girls.

Our Easter Joy

"Alleluia, He is risen, Alleluia!"

My parish community is blessed to have a fabulous music ministry. One of the highlights of our Easter Vigil is the moment the cantor and choir sing the "Alleluia" before the

proclamation of the Gospel. The lights of the sanctuary are brightened, and our song is full, energized, and glorious. With the angels in heaven, we stand at God's throne and give thanks and praise: "Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!"

During the season of Lent, we have fasted from this powerful word. The Church removes "alleluia" from our liturgies to remind us that we must be on a constant journey of transformation if we are to truly praise God and live in His Kingdom. Lent has reminded us that the Kingdom of God is, as theologians say, "already and not yet." It is already here, because Jesus Christ lived, taught, suffered, died, rose, and sent us His Spirit, establishing the Kingdom on earth. It is not yet because the world remains caught in webs of sin and deceit, and there are still places that have not heard the Good News. When we fast from singing with the angels in Lent, we remember our sinfulness, repent, and resolve to carry His message more fully. By letting go of this word, we hear it in fresh, new ways as we celebrate Christ's Resurrection and rededicate ourselves as "alleluia" people.

One of the wonderful practices of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is that of "burying the alleluia." The children in this faith formation program write the word "alleluia" and decorate it. They then place their artwork in a box, which is either literally buried in the ground or symbolically buried in a closet or another out-of-sight location. At Easter, the tomb is opened, and the "alleluia" is sung once again. This is a wonderful practice for families as well.

In this season, we can sing "alleluia" for our table grace. Consider using the setting from Mass to tie the faith and fellowship of our family dinner table to that of our parish community. When we're in the Sunday assembly, we can be the people who sing with the enthusiasm, confidence, and gusto this prayer deserves.

And always, let us reflect not only on how we can put the "alleluia" on our lips but in our lives.

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

Easter is the annual commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ

from the dead. It is the most sacred day on the Christian calendar, celebrating one of our core Christian beliefs. While always on a Sunday, the Easter date varies, falling between March 22 and April 25. Easter in the Roman Catholic Church is always on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox.

The Easter Vigil is called by St. Augustine "the Mother of All Vigils," and Easter Sunday is the most sacred of all Sundays. The Easter Octave comprises its first eight days, the first to the second Sunday, where each day a different gospel account of the resurrection is proclaimed. The Easter season lasts fifty days, from Easter to Pentecost. It is the richest time of the church year, when we celebrate the Lord's resurrection from the dead, his ascension to the Father, and their bestowing of the Holy Spirit upon the infant Church at Pentecost.

The paschal candle (usually placed in the sanctuary near the pulpit) and baptismal font used during the Easter Vigil are central symbols of the season, while the rite of sprinkling of holy water often replaces the penitential act at Sunday Mass.

Easter Duty

All Catholics are under a grave obligation to worthily receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist at least once a year, during the Easter Season. The Easter Season begins on Easter Sunday and continues until Pentecost Sunday. **Homebound and hospitalized parishioners** are welcome to contact the Rectory to arrange Communion calls.

"Easter water is a symbol of life, of the resurrection,"

You may bring your holy water bottles with you to Mass anytime over the Easter Season to re-fill with Easter water, which we will blessed at the Easter Vigil.

Traditionally, Easter Water is sprinkled on family members and the rooms of homes while reciting a prayer such as the following special blessing: . . .

Father: Graciously hear us, Holy Lord, Almighty Father and Eternal God, that, even as You protected the homes of the Hebrew people leaving Egypt by means of the destroying angel; which homes were stained with the blood of a lamb (which prefigures our Pasch in which Christ was immolated); so may you in the same manner condescend to send your holy angel from heaven that he may guard, foster, protect, visit, and defend all the inhabitants of this dwelling. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
