In the Church, we observe a liturgical calendar that takes us through the life of Jesus and highlights fundamental doctrines of our faith. Starting with this Sunday, our observance of the Easter Season continues for one more week until the celebration of Pentecost. While many outside of the Church only see Easter as a one-day celebration, we celebrate for an entire season, much like we do during Christmas as well. Of course, this calendar only serves to remind us and point to greater realities.

We are not called to be more generous at Easter or Christmas than we are on other days. We do not choose to love more during one time of the year. The fact is that Jesus is alive right now and at all times is calling us to give of ourselves.

When we make an intentional decision to follow Jesus and adopt a stewardship way of life, we commit ourselves to this journey 365 days a year. We are an Easter people at all times. The high and low points of our journey are not tied to a liturgical year, but instead to our own experiences of life and shortcomings. A season or holiday may make it easier to have a giving attitude, but we need to do the same when little around us is pointing us in that direction. It is sometimes when few are paying attention that love and generosity are most needed.

The Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer

The center and high point of the entire celebration of Mass is the Eucharistic Prayer. The Preface is the first part of that beautiful and important prayer.

The familiar dialogue between priest and people begins the Preface. It's a reminder that this prayer is a joint venture of the baptized and ordained, offered in the presence of God, and that its central focus is thanksgiving.

While the introduction is always the same, its body is changeable in harmony with the larger celebration. Here the priest, in the name of those gathered, glorifies God the Father and gives thanks to him for the whole work of salvation, or for some particular facet of it, according to the day, festivity, or time of year.

The Preface concludes with the *Sanctus* (Holy, Holy, Holy) acclamation that leads us into the Eucharistic Prayer proper. It is sung or recited by the congregation, joining with the heavenly powers, proclaiming the holiness of God. The beginning of this acclamation repeats the song of the angels before the throne of God in the Old Testament, and its conclusion echoes the shouts of the crowds as Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.



Saint Patrick's 175th Anniversary!



St. Patrick's is proud to be a pillar of the Catholic faith in Bay Ridge for 175 years and we want to celebrate this amazing achievement with our parishioners and community. Our 175th Anniversary Year provides us time to reflect on our spiritual journey, acknowledge the contributions of our parish family and rejoice in the unity and growth we have experienced over the years.

1920-1935

Father Jeremiah J. Kent, who had served in St. Patrick parish from 1901 to 1912, returned as pastor in 1920. In December, 1923, ground was broken for the extension of the Fourth Avenue Subway Line to 95th Street. This event had a profound effect on the growth of the Fort Hamilton neighborhood. It initiated a building boom which brought many new families into the parish. Many of the stores, with apartments above, were built along the avenues.

On September 18, 1920, Father Kent gave benediction following the ceremony of the unveiling of the monument in honor of the Fort Hamilton heroes who answered their country's call in World War I and those who eventually made the supreme sacrifice of their lives. The monument stands in the small park located at 94th Street and 4th Ave. It underwent extensive renovations in 1999.

The rapid increase in population had other effects on St. Patrick parish. Other parishes were established to serve the ever-growing number of Catholics in the community. In 1921, St. Ephrem parish was established. In the following year, the northern boundary of St. Patrick parish was fixed when St. Anselm parish was founded.

Under Father Kent's guidance, a drive was begun for the erection of a new church. The original church was demolished in April, 1925, and the cornerstone for the current structure laid October 11th. The first Mass was celebrated in the basement of the new church at midnight on Christmas.

The church was dedicated by Bishop Molloy on December 12, 1926. It was situated on the site of the church which had been blessed by Archbishop Hughes exactly 74 years prior. The entire cost of the building was estimated at \$250,000.

On October 31, 1925, the 95th Street station of the Fourth Avenue Subway Line opened. Now, finally, public transportation was in place to connect the Fort Hamilton community to the rest of Brooklyn and to Manhattan.

It was inevitable that the increase in population would have an impact on the parish school, requiring it to be enlarged. Since the parish plant had become surrounded by apartment houses and other buildings, it was impossible to acquire new land adjacent to the school. It became necessary, therefore, to build on the same plot. Consequently, a new wing of eight classrooms was built on the lot behind the existing school. This was opened in February, 1932. Two years later, Father Kent laid the cornerstone for the front section of the school. The financial depression, which had brought the building boom at an end in 1929, had delayed the completion of the project until 1935, when the entire building was completed. 1935 also marked the establishment of St. Bernadette parish. This was the last time any territory was taken from St. Patrick's.
